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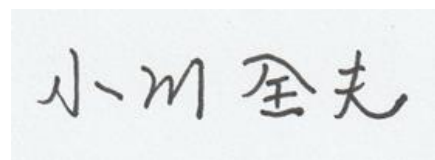

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Welcome to Fukuoka where ACAP was born!

The Active Aging Consortium in Asia Pacific (ACAP), which was born in Fukuoka City in 2005, will celebrate its 20th anniversary in 2025 after traveling on-site to various countries and continuing to hold online meetings under the COVID-19 pandemic. The 20th Active Aging Conference in Asia Pacific will be held under the title "Towards Global Active Aging: Lesson Learned from Fukuoka." It will be held in Fukuoka City. Countries around the world are currently at a stage where they have no choice but to tackle the issue of global aging, and interest in Japan as the most advanced country in terms of population aging. ACAP regards initiatives to demonstrate resilience to population aging as active aging (in Japanese, "SHOGAI-GEN'EKI" "creating a society that is active throughout life"), and has been leading efforts in each country and region to introduce initiatives for mutual understanding and collaboration. In 2016, Fukuoka City held a convention to commemorate the 10th anniversary of ACAP, which was co-hosted with a symposium of the Japan Ministry of Health, Labour and Welfare, and has been promoting the concept of "Fukuoka 100," which is to start 100 initiatives for the era of 100-year life era. Based on these efforts, experts from various countries will gather to discuss mutual understanding of population aging issues in the Asia-Pacific region and future collaborative efforts.

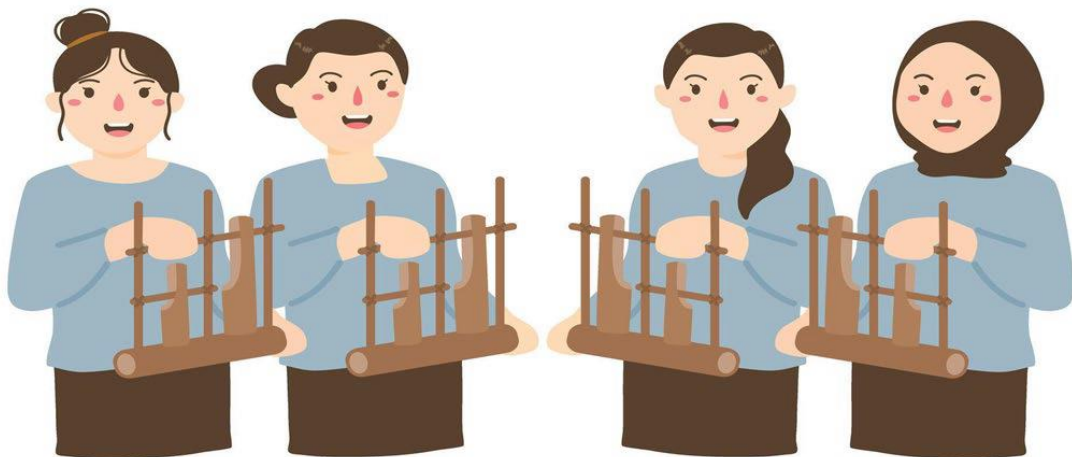

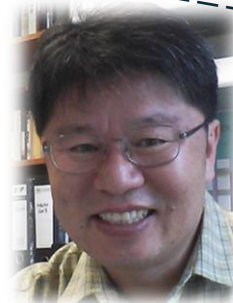

Course A:

Dementia-Friendly Course (Capacity: 30)

- This course includes visits to a dementia-friendly subway station, a key Dementia-Friendly Center, and Fukufuku Plaza, which raises awareness of aging societies. Participants will also tour the Fukuoka City Dissemination Center of Practice for Long-term Care and other relevant sites, exploring key aspects of dementia-friendly urban development.

09:30-10:00 Fukuoka City Subway Hashimoto Station "Station Plaza"

- Hashimoto Station Plaza, renovated in May 2019, is a dementia-friendly public space. It features a barrier-free design, clear signage, and strategically placed benches, ensuring accessibility and ease of navigation for elderly individuals and those with dementia.



10:30-12:00 Long-term Care Facility for Seniors “MANA House”

- "MANA House enables elderly individuals to maintain a familiar lifestyle, even when living outside their own home. It fosters independence, a sense of community, and life enjoyment. Additionally, it integrates digital transformation and employs foreign personnel to address caregiver shortages, ensuring high-quality support and a comfortable living environment.



13:00-14:00 Fukuoka City Dementia Friendly Center

- The Fukuoka City Dementia Friendly Center is designed to be inclusive and dementia-friendly, offering a clear and comfortable space. It encourages individuals with dementia to stay socially active, fosters community connections, and provides tools and devices that help visitors understand how people with dementia perceive and interact with their surroundings.



14:30-16:00 Fukufuku Plaza and Dissemination Center of Practice for Long-term Care

- Fukufuku Plaza promotes community welfare by providing elderly care consultations, training sessions, and workshops. The Fukuoka City Dissemination Center of Practice for Long-term Care offers practical training, supports caregivers, exhibits welfare equipment, and provides consultations on home modifications to ensure elderly individuals can live safely and comfortably in their homes."

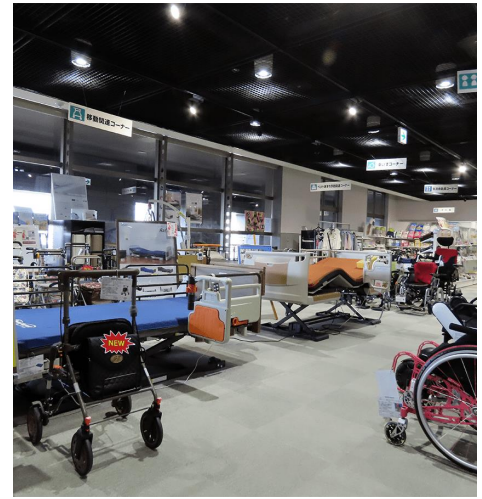
10:00-12:00 Long-term Care Facility for Seniors "At Home Hakata no Mori"

- "At Home Hakata no Mori" is a senior care facility in Fukuoka City, offering a comfortable, barrier-free, and home-like environment for residents, including those with dementia. It emphasizes personalized care and community engagement through volunteer activities and events, ensuring residents remain socially connected.



13:00-14:30 Welfare Equipment Exhibition Room & Caregiving DX Center

- The Welfare Equipment Exhibition Room displays assistive devices for independent living and caregiver support. The Fukuoka Prefecture Caregiving DX Support Center acts as a one-stop hub for improving caregiving facility operations and promoting the adoption of caregiving technology.



15:00-16:30 Fukuoka Citizen Disaster Prevention Center

- The Fukuoka Citizen Disaster Prevention Center educates residents on disaster preparedness through interactive simulators for earthquakes, fires, and strong winds. It offers hands-on training, including fire extinguisher use and evacuation drills, making it a valuable resource for schools and corporate programs.

Hakata Old Town Walking Tour (Capacity: 30)

- The Hakata area of Fukuoka City has long thrived as a center of commerce and trade, preserving a wealth of traditional culture and cultural heritage. This walking tour offers a journey through Hakata's rich history.

10:00-11:00 Tochoji Temple

- Tochoji Temple, founded in 806 by Kukai (Kobo Daishi), is one of Fukuoka's oldest temples. It houses Japan's largest wooden seated Buddha (10.8 meters tall). The temple also features a beautiful five-story pagoda and intricate Buddhist carvings. Located in central Hakata, it offers a unique glimpse into Japan's Buddhist culture and traditional architecture.



11:00-12:00 The Hakata Machiya Folk Museum

- The Hakata Machiya Folk Museum is a restored Meiji-era merchant house, offering a glimpse into traditional life and craftsmanship. Visitors can watch live demonstrations of Hakata weaving and Hakata dolls, observing artisans at work. The museum also features a gift shop where you can buy local crafts and specialties, making it a great place to experience Hakata's rich cultural heritage.



13:00-14:00 Kushida Shrine

- Kushida Shrine is Hakata's guardian shrine, famous for the Hakata Gion Yamakasa Festival. A decorative festival float is displayed year-round. The shrine features a sacred ginkgo tree believed to bring longevity and ward off misfortune. Visitors can also see the Hakata-bei wall, an important cultural site.



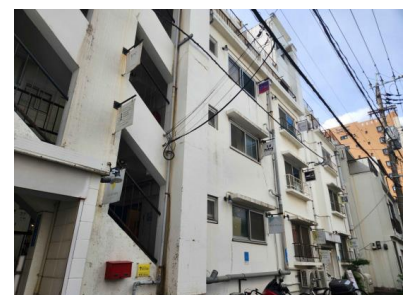
14:00-14:15 Kawabata Shopping Arcade

- Kawabata Shopping Arcade, located in Hakata, Fukuoka, is a historic 400-meter-long arcade blending tradition and modernity. Lined with restaurants, souvenir shops, and long-established stores, it's famous for Hakata specialties like udon, ramen, and mentaiko. Adjacent to Kushida Shrine, it becomes lively during the Hakata Gion Yamakasa Festival. The covered arcade allows for year-round shopping and dining.



14:15-15:30 Reizensou and Hakata Doll Painting Experience

- Reizensou is a cultural facility in Hakata, Fukuoka, renovated from a retro apartment building built in 1958. It houses art galleries, cafes, and creator offices. Here, you can experience painting Hakata dolls, a traditional craft known for its delicate hand-painted designs and elegant forms. These clay figurines date back to the 17th century. (1,650 yen per person; self-paid).



Optional tour to Goto Island, Nagasaki

20th ~23th March



The Goto Islands are a remote island in Nagasaki Prefecture. Before the Meiji Restoration, many Christians kept their faith in secret. Then, UNESCO recognized here a World Cultural Heritage.

Since the period of economic growth, the emigration of young people from here has continued, and the remaining population is aging. The percentage of over 65 years old population in Goto City is 40.8% in 2020. It is 20 years ahead when Japanese population aging will reach its maximum. However, there are many efforts to revitalize: use new drones, autonomous driving, and smart care-technology to support the lives of people who still want to live on remote islands. Also, new immigrants are invited by the local government.
